

Our recent Close Up exhibition highlighted many stunning images and the difficulties associated with close-up or macro photography. We had slightly fewer entries than last year but more awards. Our very own judge, Tony Luha set a high bar for future judges. For new members, don't hesitate to submit images to the exhibitions; it's a great learning tool overall and even more meaningful when receiving comments on your own images.

Congratulations are in order to **Cynthia Ball** and **Isobel Pearson** for having completed the WAPF 52x2 challenge. It's a big effort but clearly rewarding. Everyone I have spoken to who has completed this challenge has felt it has benefited their photography enormously and have been pleased with their results.

Workshop will host the "NEPG Shootout" this year. This is a photo competition between WCC and NEPG (Northern Exposure Photographic Group) that is fiercely contested. A third club may be involved to provide a bit more competitiveness. There will be 7 topics; each club generates 7 groups, one topic per group. Each group will submit their image for the exhibition. It's challenging and good fun. This again is a grand opportunity for new photographers to join with the experienced and contribute to a joint effort, learning many techniques along the way. So please present topics you prefer to the committee. It's best we decide on the topics rather than have NEPG decide for us.

The WA Camera Club have a very strong B&W photographic group and would like to have a competition with WCC. If there is interest in this, please indicate this to us. Some in our club say we will get 'thumped', but we have excellent B&W work, so we should be up for the challenge.

Other competitions in 2020 that are worthy of entries from WCC are ClickWest, PrintWest and In My View. Please refer to the WAPF website for dates and details. There are some really good prizes, but most importantly, it is a way to have your photographs displayed publicly. The 2019 'In My View' competition used Albumworks to print the books in high quality gloss. They are offering 40% discount on your first book, so it is worth a look.

A reminder that the PhotoMarket is on February 23 at Leederville Town Hall, and of course, we need more names on the catering list.

The AGM is on February 19 with guest speaker **Jan Robinson** showing her expertise in bird photography. Jan is a colourful and energetic lady and the evening will be most enjoyable. The AGM is also the time for members to volunteer some time to occasional tasks and also to join the Committee. It is a group effort, no-one is assigned long or onerous tasks and help is always at hand. So please put your hand up on the day or register on the web.

On that note, the AGM will present a new President whom I fully endorse and who will provide an excellent steady pair of hands. With commitments for much of this year, I must pass the baton. Unfortunately, I will be away at the time of the AGM, so Diederik will take the helm for this.

It has been my pleasure to have been President of WCC and to have worked with a super committee and a fine and wonderfully collegiate club. I thank you all for the privilege and look forward to being back at the club later in the year.

The first exhibition of the year attracted 77 entries and we were very fortunate to have our own club member, **Tony Luha**, judge the images. Tony was very encouraging, informative and provided some very positive, useful feedback.

Congratulations to **Isobel Pearson**, for gaining the judge's vote for overall best subject image for *Water nymph*. I suggest you do yourselves a favour and check this out online. As Tony said, 'A truly stunning image, no reflections, no harsh lighting......Masterclass!' Isobel also presented us with *Red Descent*, a superb, beautifully composed architectural image which as Tony pointed out, 'the author should be proud to hang on the wall' and her subtle image *Wind in the Willow* a fine example of a technique using camera movement. Well done Izzy!

Adrian Cooper, true to form, submitted some impressive images. His standout subject images: Sand, Shells & 8 Beady Eyes and Branching, both fine, pin-sharp beautiful macro examples won the judge over, with the latter image impeccably printed on exquisite paper. Tony commented on his other submission, Water off a Duck's Back, drawing viewers eyes to the exceptionally clever vignette and colour palette which seemed to have the subject 'leap into life'. Great effort Adrian!

Chris Hawkins, also true to form, presented us with some truly sensational images. His outstanding mono print *The Black Sheep of the Family* a cleverly seen façade of houses, doors and windows was pointed out to be 'a fine example of good tones, shadows and details' and won the members' vote for best print on the night. *Early Riser*, his image of a 'faultless bird in flight, with impeccable feather detail, crop and composition' was well received, as was his other mono of great tones, *Gift Wrapped*, a 'top quality, beautiful diagonal composition'. Congratulations Chris!

Gary Louth has had a successful start to the year with his stunning entries too. *Metal Waves*, a sensational mono architectural image of 'delightful composition, gorgeous light, and wonderful curves....another fine image the author should be proud to hang on a wall'. Gary's other submission of an impressive capture of an *Indonesian Red Dragonfly* was a magnificent, detailed macro. Well done Gary!

Glenda Gore, a novice contributor, had some wonderful bird portraits for her submissions this month, and should be feeling very proud! *Colours of the Sun* a wonderful capture of a sea bird was well liked, as was her other image, *Beauty in the Black Vulture*. Great job Glenda!

Further Gold awards went to **Jon Stout**, for his 'perfectly exposed, outstanding' image *Believe to Achieve*. The judge made comment too of being 'absolutely lost in the admiration of the skill of the photographer' with this image.

The judge commented on **Frans Hugo's** unique *Reflections*, as being simply 'a great print, a thing of beauty'.

Nola Sumner's, beautifully lit mono, *Morning Dew*, was highly regarded by Tony stating it as a 'superb piece of photography that I can look at for a long time'.

Tony Hopkins' truly incredible macro shot, *Small Fly* had Tony admiring the pin sharp, details and top quality of this image.

Patricia Crosthwaite impressed all with *Te Rewa Rewa Bridge*, a 'fabulous mono, a well-seen and well- timed shot with pleasing negative space'.

Other Silver awards went to **Faye Arcaro** for her adorable mono image of children and happiness with *And Then There Were 3;* **Theresa Pitter** for her loveable mono display of kangaroos sparring, *Sibling Rivalry;* **Juliet Magee** for an exquisite colourful, class macro shot of a butterfly, *Male Cairns Birdwing;* **Jill Luha** for a truly exquisite flower macro, *Succulent Tiny Frond;* **Ian Sampson** had the judge commenting, 'Just when you think you've seen everything, someone comes up with a good idea!' with his clever wide field view of *Pinnacles;* **Jane Speijers'** delightful Hummingbird submission, *Colour* was also highly commended.

Bremer Canyon photographic opportunity By Georgina Wilson

Over the last six years the Bremer Canyon off WA's South Coast has become one of the world's top destinations to view killer whales in the wild.



Visitors come from everywhere to the small coastal town of Bremer Bay for this experience.

Club member and specialist wildlife photographer **Keith Lightbody** has spent time there between January and April for seven years, often as a photographer for Naturaliste Charters a company that offers day trips.

In 2019 and again this summer he encouraged interested members to offer their services, and this year both **Deiderik Speijers** and I spent a week at Bremer.

In early February I drove from Perth via Katanning and Borden (ignoring Google maps as they send you via Albany) on a Friday, taking about six hours.

Accommodation was in the 'crew house' shared with the skipper, deckhand and marine biologist. A couple of filmmakers were also present, including the canyon 'discoverer', Esperance local Dave Riggs.

Each morning the photographer collects the food for passengers by about 7.30am, but the crew head off much earlier to prepare the boat, a sturdy catamaran built for the Southern Ocean.



It takes about an hour and a half to reach the 'hot spot' about 50km offshore. Orcas can appear almost immediately, but occasionally they fail to show at all. This almost happened on my first day. At 3.25pm, after endless sailing over likely territory near the edge of the continental

shelf, the deckhand on the roof finally made a sighting: "Orcas at two o'clock!"

Then it was on for nearly two hour and a half hours, as we



followed a playful orca pod. No-one cared that it was nearly 7pm before getting back to port, although a rival operator had returned hours earlier.



We saw orcas on five days, sometimes immediately but sometimes after a few hours. Many seabirds follow the orcas hoping for scraps from any kill, and if you saw birds you could be confident that orcas were near.

But whether they came to play or largely ignored us depended on their hunting success. With full bellies after killing a beaked whale or similar prey, the games were on with orcas cavorting under the boat. But when hunting was foremost, a brief distant glimpse might be our lot.

Volunteer photographers have two main roles – recording all sightings to help build the database of specific orcas present, and providing up to 10 images for possible use on the company's daily blog. And when you have taken 1000 images over a day, rapid selection and watermarking is good, unless you want a testy marine biologist!

The seas were too rough to go out on my last two days, but many thanks to Keith and Naturaliste Charters for a unique and exciting experience.

I am originally from the Wirral in the North West of England, I Joined WCC in 2019 to meet like minded people and further gain more experience and learn new techniques in photography,

My earliest memory of taking photos was on a school trip to the Chester Zoo, with a 110 film point and shoot instamatic. I would have been around 9 years old. Through my teens I used different cameras mainly for holidays and the occasional motorbike track day.

Through my working career I owned a company: we designed and sold furniture. Each year we would have to create a new brochure for our latest designs. I employed a photographer to do this for us, and I suppose this was when my interest in photography was sparked once more.

In 2017 my wife, who is a dance instructor, asked me to come to the studio Christmas party and to bring my camera, which I did.

A great afternoon was had by all and many memorable shots were taken.

As a result of this I was invited to take some promotional shots for the studio.

Other members of the Dance Studio on seeing the photos voiced their interest in having photos of their own and I consequently was asked to run a weekend photo shoot.



This is where my dance photography really started to take shape.

From here I built a home studio where we have done varied shoots with dancers, kick boxers, gymnasts and circus performers/aerial artists. We have used various material for photo effects including powder, fabric.



In the summer of last year we built a shallow pool in the studio to do water shots. We are repeating this exercise this summer.

I have done a few photography courses and have recently done a course with Seng Mah from Venture Photography. Of all the courses I have done over the years, I would say I received more information and guidance from Seng than any other photographer. I highly recommend him.



I get inspiration from other photographers such as John Applygate, Rachel Neville, and Haze Kware.

At the moment I am using a Nikon D750. My go-to lens is a Nikon 24 to 70 F2.8.



For lighting I am using two Jimbei 610 battery operated strobe lights.

These strobes, I feel, are fantastic value and easy to use in studio or on location.

When shooting in the studio I find it useful to tether my camera to a Macbook Pro with Case Air. I find Case



Air stable and without the cables connecting me to the laptop, it gives more freedom of movement around the studio.

Being a member

of the club has given my an insight into other genres of photography.

Every time I attend a meeting, I always pick up useful pieces of information and techniques or ideas to improve my photography skills.

I look forward to 2020 and to get more involved within the club.
